Identifying Japanese best practices in labor-management relations

TOKYO—Thirty-four representatives of APO member economies are scheduled to convene in Tokyo, 17–19 May 2016, for the Forum on Labor-Management Relations for Policymakers, Labor Unions, and Top Management. Funded by the Government of Japan and organized by the APO, the three-day forum will explore the roles of government, national trade unions, and employers' federations in promoting constructive, harmonious labor-management relations for productivity improvement. Participants include officials of governments, labor unions, national productivity organizations, the private sector, and academia involved in the promotion and enhancement of good labor-management relations in various spheres.

The forum will feature presentations by experts from the Japan Productivity Center, Japan International Labor Foundation, Japan Business Federation (Keidanren), Japan Council of Metalworkers' Unions, and Ministry of Health, Labour and Welfare. Also scheduled on days 2 and 3 are visits to the Japanese Trade Union Confederation and Suntory Co., Ltd. Participants will have an opportunity to engage in a group discussion and presentation session on 18 May to examine the lessons learned from the Japanese experience and identify the best policies and initiatives of the government, employers' associations, and trade unions to ensure sound labormanagement relations for higher productivity.
